Foreign radio signals are jammed, leaving citizens cut off from global information [1]. Approved North Korean smartphones connect only to a restricted intranet controlled by the regime.
- 3. **Relentless Indoctrination**: The regime perpetuates its ideology through constant indoctrination. Citizens are bombarded with propaganda that glorifies the ruling Kim family. Dissent is met with severe punishment, reinforcing fear and obedience [1].
- 4. **Healthcare Crisis**: Access to medical care is limited. The closure of borders during the pandemic disrupted aid and imports, exacerbating shortages. Malnutrition and inadequate healthcare contribute to the suffering of North Koreans [1].
- 5. **Prison Camps and Forced Labor**: Political prisoners endure brutal labor camps, where they face torture, beatings, and sexual abuse. These camps are described as "harsh beyond endurance" by human rights organizations [2].
- 6. **Fear of Informants**: Citizens live in constant fear of informants. Reporting on neighbors or family members can lead to rewards, while failing to report suspicious activity can result in punishment. This pervasive surveillance stifles any form of dissent [1].
- 7. **Depression and Loneliness**: The lack of freedom, isolation, and harsh living conditions contribute to widespread depression and loneliness among North Koreans. The absence of mental health resources exacerbates their suffering [3].
- 8. **International Efforts and Escapes**: International actors continue to highlight North Korea's human rights abuses. However, very few manage to escape the country. In 2019, just over 1,000 North Koreans fled to South Korea, highlighting the immense challenges faced by those seeking freedom [2].
